On January 23rd, the kindergarten class had a one-hundred-ful day! We began the day by getting into the appropriate attire, which included 100th day hats and glasses that looked like the number 100! The hats were extra special because they were made by the students, and had 100 pieces of paper on the top for extra decoration. We joined the rest of the elementary students at 10:00 in the gym to do 100 exercises which were led by the sixth grade class (bottom right picture). We read a 100th day story, and then wrote one of our own. We wrote about what we would like to have 100 of - and what we would never want 100 of. We wrote numbers to 100 on a chart, and then we colored in certain numbers to reveal a picture that was the number 100. The really amazing part was everyone wrote their numbers to 100 in 15 minutes or less! This is big news for our class! After lunch, we made 100th day necklaces with Fruit Loops. It was an easy task, because we just had to make 10 groups of 10. Some of the students really challenged their brains and made patterns with their Fruit Loops! We had a special 100th day snack and finished the day by sharing our 100th day collections. The students collected 100 items at home and brought the items to school in a special 100th day box. First Grade News

The first graders (pictured below) enjoyed celebrating the 100th day of school. Each student made an art project containing 100 items from home. They displayed their creative projects in the hall (see picture on front page). They played a "Race to 100" game using a die and a 100's chart. The K-6 students went to the gym and did 100 exercises which were led by the 6th graders.

In math the students are learning how to add 2-digit numbers using tens and ones blocks. In reading they read 3-letter blends in words and compared and contrasted details in their story. In science the children learned about different environments that animals live in. The students are currently reading about dinosaurs and learning about the theories about what happened to the dinosaurs to make them extinct. In Social Studies Martin Luther King, Jr. has been the main focus. The children are having a difficult time believing that those events actually took place in America. We have definitely come a long way in history!

Agricultural Mechanics Class

Two students of the Shickley Agricultural Mechanics class have been busy constructing coat racks for the Fillmore County Museum located in Fairmont. Charles Dondlinger approached the students asking if they might be interested in helping with the construction. Accepting the challenge, Tyler Peppie and Tyler Reece have been very active the last 3 weeks working on the project. (See picture right.) A total of 35 coat racks will be assembled and finished with a veneer coat. They will be used to hang uniforms and other clothing in the museum.



High School English/Language Arts

In high school English classes, students have been working hard to improve their language arts skills. Students have spent time practicing a variety of reading strategies, such as previewing texts, analyzing organization, making predictions, and summarizing and responding to text. They have taken on various roles that readers play such as Connector, Questioner, Illustrator, and Literary Luminary in order to engage in their reading.

While focusing on reading skills, the 9th and 10th grade students worked in collaborative groups to create reading strategies reference guides, and they worked individually to create Personal Reading Procedures to aid them in approaching challenging texts. The upperclassmen have been sharpening their research skills by improving their abilities to locate, evaluate, and utilize a variety of resources. Improving media literacy skills is especially important now that we are transitioning to a 1:1 learning environment and preparing students for a future in which multimedia are part of their daily personal and educational lives; students have been discovering many new resources, practicing multiple ways of locating and managing electronic information, and learning helpful time-saving tips.

Students also continue to work on essential skills in writing. They have been practicing the process of breaking down a writing prompt to identify the specific topic, audience, and purpose that is expected of them when writing. They have used the Six Traits of Effective Writing to evaluate the writing of others as well as to inform their own writing choices. The sophomores have been practicing writing in both English and speech class. In speech, the Trait of organization and the importance of providing citations for sources have been emphasized. The juniors have been gearing up for and completing the NeSA-W (state writing assessment). They have been making great improvements in their persuasive writing, and it has been exciting to witness their growth! The seniors studied cultures of their choosing from around the world and discovered many ways the literary contributions of diverse people are important. They then created presentations in which they made book recommendations to Mrs. Kobza, persuading her to add specific books from these cultures to our school library.

We plan to make some of these group and individual projects available through the school website in a new student projects section that will be coming soon!

On January 23, 2013, 13 members of the Shickley FFA Chapter attended the District 6 Leadership Skills Events in Aurora, Nebraska. The Shickley FFA members, along with students from 12 other schools, were involved in events to help improve their leadership skills. These FFA members participated in the following contests: Creed Speaking Catherine Mick and Tristen Mosier received a red. Creed Speaking is when FFA members recite the five paragraphs of the Creed; they also answer questions about what the creed means to them. Megan Swartzendruber and Nathan Hendrickson participated in Junior Public Speaking. This is a four to six minute speech on a current agricultural issue that affects the world. There were nine competitors in the Junior Public Speaking Competition. Megan received a purple ribbon and qualified for state competition in April. Dillon Deepe competed in Natural Resources Speaking against five others; he received a red. Dylan Lauenstein competed in the Senior Public Speaking Competition, earning a 2nd purple and qualifying for state. This contest involves going through the application and interviewing process, including developing a resume, cover letter, and a follow up letter.
