Shickley Public School - Preparing Students for Success

Notes from Mr. Jorgenson

There are only two months to go until summer break. It is hard to believe, but graduation and summer are fast approaching. Plans for the summer are starting to come together and there will be some significant projects going on at Shickley Public Schools. At a board meeting on March 23rd, the School Board approved projects at the school. The total costs of the projects will not be known, until all of the final bids have been received. However, we know that we are not going to exceed \$2.6 million. At the same meeting, the board approved using D.A. Davidson to help us sell bonds to fund the project. We will be levying money into our Qualified Capital Purpose Undertaking Fund (QCPUF). This fund allows us to levy up to \$0.052 for a project. The bonds will then be paid off over a 10-year period. Here are the areas that we are looking at as part of the project:

- 1. Electrical: As most people understand, the electrical systems installed when the 1907, 1954, and 1964 portions of the building were constructed were not made to use with the amount of electronic equipment that is used in school today. Many areas of our school are dangerously overloading the system, kicking out breakers during parts of the school year. Many of the panels do not meet code and can be a hazard themselves. The electrical system needs to be upgraded before any other projects would be feasible.
- 2. Heating and Air Conditioning: We purchased a new boiler system for the 1954 portion of the building. It was installed about 3 years ago. That heating system will remain in place and new air conditioning will be installed as well as some back-up heat. However, the steam boiler in the 1907 building is on its last breath. We will get through this heating season, but our boiler inspector told us that he would not approve it for another season. It is from the 60's and we are still burning fuel oil to operate it. It will be replaced with individual heating/cooling units in each room. New windows may be installed and the window air units would then be discarded. Heating and air in the main gym, cafeteria, and art room are also being considered.
- 3. Restrooms and Locker Rooms: These are possible areas to be improved. The improvements would involve replacing some flooring, stalls, and fixtures.
- 4. Entry Way: The last major area being considered is our entry way. In today's world, safety can never be taken for granted. The current arrangement of the front of our building does not allow us to visibly ensure that our building is safe. We are unable to see who enters the building, thus with some rearranging of the offices, we could make our school much safer.

Again, all of the areas are being considered. At the March 23rd board meeting, the school board made a significant step towards ensuring that a school will be in Shickley for many years to come. All of the areas considered will have a dramatic impact on the learning environment, and we will see student pride increase. I am excited to see the improvement not only in our students but also in our teachers. We often times take for granted the environment we live and work in and what impact it has on our lives. Shickley Public School hosts Red Cross Blood Drive

On Friday, March 18th, Shickley Public School held their fourth annual blood drive. The Red Cross's theme to their blood drives this year is "Hope begins with you."

At the blood drive, the National Honor Society gave hope by providing the personnel needed to load and unload the equipment and staff the registration table. The faculty and staff of Shickley Public School helped by providing the food and drinks for donors during the drive. Additionally, 39 people donated 38 total units of

blood. This helped Shickley to meet the goal set of 35 units, and has qualified the school to be eligible for a \$250 scholarship from the Red Cross for one senior.

The Shickley Public School blood drive is one of three held each year in Shickley, with the others being held in the fall and in the summer. Shickley Public School is proud to be a part of this rotation and proud to have chosen to help save lives.

Longhorn Speakers Qualify for State Contest

Members of the Shickley speech team competed in the D2-1 district, hosted by McCool Junction on Tuesday, March 15th. Competitors who finished in the top three in the district moved on to the state contest, held on the UNK campus on Thursday, March 24, 2016. State qualifiers are Josiah Kamler (3rd place) in Oral Interpretation of Humorous Prose, Caleb Hendrickson (2nd place) in Extemporaneous Speaking, Nicole Swartzendruber (1st place) in Informative Speaking, Madison Yantzie and Chris Lichti (1st place) in Duet Acting, and Lichti (1st place) in Entertainment Speaking. Also competing in the district contest were Caitlin Mosier (4th place) and in Oral Interpretation of Serious Prose, Isaac Kamler in Oral Interpretation of Serious Prose, Kellen Reinsch (5th place) in Oral Interpretation of Poetry.

Throughout the season the Shickley speakers attended multiple speech meets where they competed in the same events they eventually entered in the district contest. Their first contest was at Columbus Scotus on January 23rd. Yantzie and Lichti placed 5th, Lichti finished 4th, and Hendrickson was named Top Novice. On January 30th they went to Osceola where Swartzendruber placed 5th and Lichti was runner-up. At Sandy Creek's invitational on February 13th, Hendrickson, who had begun competing at the varsity level, finished 3rd. At Grand Island Northwest on February 20th Swartzendruber placed 6th and Lichti came in 3rd.

The Crossroads Conference (CRC) contest was hosted by Meridian on February 24th. At the CRC meet, Swartzendruber placed 6th and Lichti was named conference runner-up.

To round out the regular season the team competed in two post-conference invitationals prior to the district contest. They went to Minden on February 27th where Hendrickson finished in 4th place and Lichti came in 2nd in the varsity division. In the novice division, Reinsch and Kadel each placed 6th in their events, and Mosier earned the gold medal. On March 5th the team competed at the Doniphan-Trumbull meet. Hendrickson placed 6th, Lichti finished 4th, and Caitlin Mosier placed 3rd in their individual events.

Finally, on Monday, March 14th at Longhorn Speech Night, the team members presented their speeches for a home audience in the Shickley gymnasium to close out their regular season. Reflecting on the season, head

coach Jennifer Ippensen said, "Students who compete on the speech team have a special bond with one another. What I have been most impressed with throughout the season is how much they support one another."

Are The Dots Lining Up?

For over twenty-five years, a small group of community members have been regularly meeting with the sole purpose of keeping Shickley vibrant and progressing. This group of people is known as the Shickley Improvement Committee. This committee routinely conducts a community survey. The most recent community survey was mailed in January and went to all Shickley school district addresses. Over the years, numerous improvement projects have been completed based upon the survey results. Some of the projects have included street pavings, the Westside Park shelter, the welcome sign on highway 74, the community center, Shickley recycling, and the Shickley Community Foundation.

From the most recent survey, sixty-seven were returned. This doesn't sound like many, but it does represent 20% which is above average for this type of survey and is similar to past survey return results.

One of the open-ended survey questions was "What makes you most proud of Shickley?" The most popular response (27 was the count, or 40% of the responses) specifically mentioned the Shickley school system.

This is positive news to all who have a vested interest in Shickley Public Schools. An indication of patron support of Shickley Public Schools is that the greenhouse will be paid for entirely by private donations and grants. Why did I choose to write about this? The community support for the school certainly gives the Board of Education a direction for decision-making including infrastructure renovation. Other items of interest that bode well for Shickley Public Schools include the Saltzman housing addition, the new fertilizer plant (to employ 30), and the continual expansion of county medical services. Did you know that the Fillmore County Hospital employs 158 (both full & part-time) people? Of these, 25% live outside of Geneva and 30% live outside of Fillmore County. Better yet, the employee average age is 43.

These are just a few of the positives that are in place for Fillmore County. Community leaders are challenged now with how to best leverage these opportunities. Shickley and its school system are well positioned to expand its population and enrollment. That alone can be an insurmountable obstacle for some communities and schools. Fortunately, we have crossed that hurdle and now have the task of promoting, recruiting, and telling the Shickley story. With that, I'll close with a quote from Steve Jobs, "You can't connect the dots looking forward; you can only connect them looking backwards. So you have to trust that the dots will somehow connect in your future. You have to trust in something - your gut, destiny, life, karma, whatever. This approach has never let me down, and it has made all the difference in my life."

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BDS Girls' Basketball Season

Finish it! That was the battle cry of the 2015-2016 BDS Lady Eagles basketball team. After finishing 4 points shy of a district final championship and a birth in the state tournament last season, the BDS Lady Eagles set their sights on Lincoln in 2016. This year's team saw four returning starters and a supporting cast that was hungry to finish what they started a year ago. This was a season of firsts for the Lady Eagles as they captured the Crossroads Conference Tournament Championship for the first time as a co-op team. In the CRC championship game the Eagles defeated a pesky Hampton Hawks team 39-36 to cut down the nets and claim the title. Rolling into sub-districts the Lady Eagles were riding a 7 game win streak and captured the #2 seed in the sub-district which matched them up against a very athletic Heartland Husky team. The Eagles escaped the first round with a 41-38 victory over the Huskies. Next up was #1 ranked Friend, the team that ended their season in the district finals a year ago. This game turned out to be one of the best games of the season for the Lady Eagles as they led for a majority of the game. However, Friend hit a big shot to take the game into overtime where the Eagles would fall once again to the Bulldogs by a score of 58-59. This time there was a small light at the end of the tunnel for the Eagles as they had positioned themselves to earn a wildcard bid and birth into the State Tournament, if the teams ahead of them in power points won in their district final games. The following week all the teams that needed to win did and allowed the BDS Lady Eagles to snag the final wildcard and a trip to Lincoln for the first time in BDS girl's basketball history. The Eagles earned the #6 seed in the tournament, which matched them up against a Fullerton Warriors team that had made the tournament the previous year. The team showed great grit and determination in Lincoln as they battled back from a 13point deficit with 4 minutes to go in the 4th quarter. The Eagles cut the lead to 3 with 26 seconds left and the ball. However, the Eagles couldn't convert and were knocked out of the tournament on the first day. The Eagles ended the season with a 19-7 record, CRC Championship, and State Tournament birth. In the eyes of the team, they accomplished what they set out to do and finished strong. The Lady Eagles will say goodbye to five great senior leaders in Catherine Mick, McKenna Schardt, Brice Ardissono, Tristen Mosier, and Melissa Hinrichs. Letter from Mr. Ippensen, Principal

This is part nine of twelve in a continuing conversation about the characteristics, skills, and abilities of a successful student, as defined by Shickley Public School.

A successful student can communicate and collaborate.

Without going too far into semantics, collaboration is the process of individuals working together as a team to accomplish a singular goal. Each member of the team puts his or her individual priorities aside in order to achieve the group's goal. If all of the members of a team aren't working together, progress is slowed and success may never be reached. In order to accomplish a team's goal, it is essential to have clear, effective, and appropriate communication between the team members, both to define the goal and to monitor progress toward the achievement of that goal. Communication comes in many shapes and forms, and successful students need to have proficiency in all of them: speaking, writing, listening, presenting, following professional etiquette, and providing customer service. These forms of communication are used to express ideas, provide instruction, inform others, share knowledge, and solve problems. To quote Henry Ford: "Coming together is a beginning; keeping together is progress; working together is success." None of that success is possible without collaboration and communication, which is essential to being successful now and in the future.
