Notes from Mr. Jorgenson

Safety: What should schools do? There is a wide variety of responses across the state for this question. Some schools are locked down like Fort Knox and others are open for anyone to enter. No one wants their school to feel like a prison, but on the flip side, no one wants to regret not having more security after an incident happens at their school. So where is the correct balance?

There is no definite answer, but I will tell you what we are doing at Shickley. Moving the offices this summer was a great change. Joyce or I can now see all of the people who will enter the building before they get to the front door. Prior to this, we couldn't see people coming into the building until they were already in the lobby. By itself, this has been a tremendous improvement. However, we have also added cameras and electronic locks to the facility. Starting October 25th, the school is now locked, including the front door.

When you visit the school, at the main entrance, there is button you will need to push that will ring in Joyce's office, my office, and Mr. Ippensen's office. We will then unlock the door for you to enter the building. When you push the button, there is also a camera that will show us who is at the front door. There are other cameras throughout the facility as well. We are now able to better monitor the playground, drop off points, and parking lots with the additional cameras. During public times of games, concerts, etc., the front doors will be open and there will not be any need to push the button. We are able to set when the doors remain unlocked and when they are closed. I am even able to control it with my cell phone.

These changes that have been made to the facility are a large step towards making Shickley Public Schools a safer place to be.





Fall is one of my favorite seasons. I don't know about you, but I find the fall season to be absolutely breathtaking; the colors, the sunsets, the trees, and decorations just bring a smile to my face. In Fall there is so much for students to witness and learn about!

Preschool students at The Early Learning Facility have been enjoying the fall season by learning about The Life Cycle of a pumpkin and searching for signs of fall. Students have enjoyed many walks around the community searching for clues that fall is here. On these walks we have spied squirrels digging for acorns, geese flying south for the winter, pumpkins on front doorsteps, blue skies, trees changing colors, and leaves falling down.

They really practiced well and didn't give up on their season after some disappointing showings on the game field. In the end it culminated in us finally playing a complete game to end the season, which hopefully gave the boys some justification for the work that they did to improve and get ready for the next level of their football careers," said Coach Schroeder. "We really had good leadership with fourteen older guys, so going into next year we will be looking for our five younger guys coming back to be ready to step up and take on a big load because there will be a lot of shoes to fill."

2016 Junior High Volleyball

What a wild ride we had this season. We had our ups and downs. Battling injuries and a helicopter ride to the ICU, we saw it all. We opened the season with two victories in the Lawrence-Nelson triangular against Superior 25-12, 25-17 and Sandy Creek 25-17, 25-17. In our game against Exeter-Milligan, we defeated them 25-7, 25-12. Then we turned around and defeated Hampton 25-18, 25-16. Our toughest game in our conference was against an evenly matched McCool Junction, and we beat them 25-18, 25-20. From there we played and beat the following teams: Sandy Creek 25-10, 25-15; Meridian 25-10, 25-11; Fillmore Central 25-18, 25-21; Dorchester 25-16, 25-22; Harvard 25-13, 25-16; and Giltner 25-20, 25-19. The B-Team participated in our BDS Tournament and finished 5th. The A-Team played in Sandy Creek's Quad Tournament, switching some girls to positions they weren't use to playing. We dropped our first set of the season against Hastings Saint Cecelia in the second set and beat them in three (25-15, 20-25, 15-8), which put us in the championship game against a hungry Fillmore Central where we dropped the first set to them 20-25, and won the second and third sets 25-22, 15-12 for the championship. The road to CRC was tough and the scores do not tell the whole story. These young ladies have been forever changed. Saturday morning of the CRC championship parents had a breakfast for the team. We stepped on the court against undefeated Shelby Rising City, the returning CRC Champions from last year. We went three sets with them, losing in the end 21-25, 25-22, 12-15. Letter from Mr. Ippensen, Principal
