




Biotechnology and Livestock Judging






Artwork on Display at NASB Convention

Volleyball Season Recap

The Lady Eagles Volleyball Team finished their season at 24-7, despite losing in the District Final. The volleyball team was comprised of 22 energetic girls who worked hard in the off-season and put forth more effort once the season started. In their first triangular of the year the team was challenged by Hampton and Exeter-Milligan, where each of the three teams came out winning one game. The Eagles made their mark right away, showing not only their fans what they were capable of, but other teams and media as well. Throughout the year the girls continued to improve and won a lot of big matches. They defeated Hampton (twice), Johnson Brock (State Champion), Meridian (3 times), and Heartland, just to name a few.

They won the BDS Invitational Tournament, had the runner-up CRC season record, got 3rd Place in the CRC Tournament, and finished as the runner-up in the district final match against Diller Odell (state runner-up). The seven losses that they encountered throughout the year came from teams that were all ranked in the top 10 in classes D-1 and D-2 at the end of the season. The coaches are very proud of how the girls played throughout the season and the outstanding effort that they put forth. They are also very excited to have four girls receive All-Conference Honors. Catherine Mick made first team and McKenna Schardt, Madison Yantzie, and Carley Elznic made honorable mention. It is very hard to say good-bye to five outstanding seniors that were a significant part to their team.

There is one, and only one, beverage that is perfectly suited for your biological needs: pure, clean, natural water. Two-thirds of our body mass is water. Here are some ideas for meeting the goals for this challenge.

- *Keep a jug or bottles of cold water in the fridge
- *Serve water with meals
- *Add slices of cucumber, lemon, lime, or other fruit to water
- *Choose smaller sized sugary drinks
- *Be a role model for your friends and family

Investing in our School's Future

A very important topic being discussed in the Unicameral is property tax reform. This discussion has significant implications for the future of our rural school districts. There are certainly many different perspectives on how schools should be financed and I do not wish to weigh in on this debate. Rather, I want to take this opportunity to share how our Board evaluates financial investments in the school so that you can have confidence in how your tax dollars are being spent.

Let me start with a few clear statements of the Boards approach to finances. 1.) Every significant expenditure the Board looks at is ultimately weighed against the benefits for educating our children. Schools exist for the education and formation of children; everything else is secondary. 2.) We believe investment in staff, technology, programs, and facilities are an important part of maintaining a viable school district. This is especially critical in rural communities faced with declining enrollments. 3.) Every single investment the Board makes is evaluated thoroughly before action is taken. Each dollar the school has access to comes from your pockets and we respect that fact.

It can be said that our Board is fiscally conservative. A very good example of this is how we have acted over the last few years. The strong ag economy of the recent past enticed many school districts to grow their expenditures. Our Board recognized that economic cycles change, so we resisted any major budgetary growth to be fiscally responsible.

Several times each year we evaluate the physical facilities of the district and make provisions for maintenance and improvements. This can be difficult at times when dealing with an aging facility that has been built over so many different decades. We have recently re-evaluated things and tried to prioritize some needed improvements to our facilities. Keep in mind facilities are but one thing we need to invest in – our programs and our staff must be invested in also.

Here is a short list of some projects that we are planning to complete and some we have been considering:

<u>Projects we are planning for:</u> Replace flooring in the entryway, hallways, and kitchen. Upgrade lockers so that backpacks can be stored. Replace broken / uneven concrete walkways in front of the school.

<u>Projects we are evaluating:</u> Remodel entryway to allow for security upgrades and bathroom improvements. Replace the old boiler system. Upgrade windows in the high school and gymnasium for improved efficiency and ventilation. Upgrade electrical service to the school and possibly add air conditioning. Add suspended ceiling to hallways in high school.

I hope this information gives you confidence in how our Board strives to be fiscally responsible. We always appreciate thoughtful input, especially on significant decisions that have to be made.

Letter from Mr. Ippensen, Principal

This is part five of twelve in a continuing conversation about the characteristics, skills, and abilities of a successful student, as defined by Shickley Public School.
