As a school we are still in the "labor" part of education. We have given the students their first MAPS test to get a benchmark score. We will work with students throughout the rest of the school year to improve these scores. One assessing feature that will be changing for high school students is that all juniors will be taking the ACT test. In the past most of our students have taken the test, but from here on out, all students will be required to take the test at least once. We are still working out the details, but this will be a change for all schools in the state. Because not all have taken the test, people must understand that most likely, average test scores for schools and for the state are going to go down because of this requirement. Still, it will be a uniform test that all juniors will be taking and will have results on whether students are college and career ready for the post-secondary level. Hopefully, Shickley Public Schools will have a great "harvest" when we get the results back on the test.

A few items to mention:

- 1. Remember that parent-teacher conferences are coming up fast. October 6th is the day. We look forward to seeing you there.
- 2. A big thanks to those who supported the silent auction for our activity groups. We were able to raise over \$11,000 for different activities we have here at Shickley.
- 3. The end of the first quarter is rapidly approaching. It's hard to believe, but yes, almost 25% of the school year is already over.
- 4. The building project is near the end. Everything should be nearly complete by the first week of October.

Be a Winner - - Don't Let the Flu Take You Out of the Game!

Public Health Solutions doesn't want flu to take you out of the game. Every year just like you need school supplies, you also need a flu shot. As many of you have probably already heard, this year the CDC is recommending that the vaccine be given by shot only. This means no flu mist will be available.

Public Health Solutions encourages you to "Protect the Ones You Love" by getting immunized against the flu. Healthy school age children may not experience complications to flu, but could risk exposing a sick elderly grandparent or baby brother/sister to the virus. The elderly and infants under 6 months of age are at a greater risk to have serious complications. With flu season almost here, Public Health Solutions District Health Department will again be offering flu immunization clinics for students at your school.

Prior to the start of clinics, students will bring home consent forms and fact sheets explaining the importance of getting the flu immunization. As parents or guardians, you are encouraged to read the information carefully, complete and sign the consent form and send it back to school with your student.

One lucky student will be a double winner! Not only will they have gotten protected against the flu by getting a flu shot, they will also be entered into a drawing. This year, Public Health Solutions will enter all students who return a completed permission form AND get the flu shot the day of the school clinic into a drawing for a \$25.00 gift card. One lucky name will be drawn at the end of the school clinic day.

Thoughts from Board Member

There is a saying that we should "prepare the child for the path, not the path for the child." I think this fits in very well with the mission statement of Shickley Public School – "preparing students for success." The pathway to success is never easy, and if we only focus on making the pathway achievable, we're not doing justice to our students. If our students are taught to overcome obstacles that they will inevitably find in their pathway, then we're on the right track. I think our teachers do an excellent job of preparing our students; however, it is not only the responsibility of our teachers, but also the responsibility of each of us as parents to do our part.

Over the years, it seems as though we may have become more lenient in holding our children accountable and requiring that they do things for themselves. This makes me think of the term "helicopter parent" which was first used by teens who said their parents would hover over them like a helicopter. In fact, this term became popular enough to become a dictionary entry in 2011. Webster defines "helicopter parent" as a parent who is overly involved in the life of his or her child. We all want what is best for our children and it is difficult when we see them fail at something, but sometimes it is these small failures that can produce very positive results in the long run. I read an article in which Dr. Deborah Gilboa stated, "Failure and challenges teach kids new skills, and, most important, teach kids that they can handle failure and challenges. Remembering to look for opportunities to take one step back from solving our child's problems will help us build the reliant, self-confident kids we need." So the next time we're faced with a situation where we could either make things easier for our children or solve the problem for them, or, let them struggle and allow them to be disappointed, remember that a diamond is merely a lump of coal that did well under pressure.

Letter from Mr. Ippensen, Principal

"Every now and then one paints a picture that seems to have opened a door and serves as a stepping stone to other things." – Pablo Picasso

It may seem strange to begin a discussion about assessment with a quote about painting, but just as a painting, or a picture is a snapshot of a moment in time, so is assessment. There are two reasons for assessment: to determine what needs to be taught, and to determine what has been learned. Too often, we assume that when we are discussing assessment, we are talking only about standardized testing, NeSA testing, or other types of tests. These tests are important, but in order for us to be able to accurately gauge what we also need to teach our students, we need to assess to assist in our planning process.

Each assessment we use provides a snapshot of each child's progress over the course of the year. As I tell students, if we want to fill a scrapbook of you, your abilities, and your growth; we are going to need to take a number of snapshots to see what you look like, and how you have grown over the course of the year, and your educational career here at Shickley. We can't build a scrapbook, though, without taking pictures.

Those pictures are taken when students take the different assessments throughout the year. There are a number of assessments Shickley Public School uses, and we try to not drag them out for too long. The STAR test students participate in three times a year helps us to establish a baseline for the student's reading ability, and then to gauge progress and growth over the course of the year. The MAP tests our students complete, also three times a year, provides another snapshot for reading, as well as a snapshot of students math ability, science understanding, and language usage (writing) skills. The DIBELS assessments measure math and reading skills and proficiency. In addition to these standardized assessments, the classroom teachers have students complete a number of assessments throughout the day, week, month, and semester in order to gauge their current progress and what each student needs to improve on. Preparing students for success can't happen by accident – we need to have a plan, and a big part of planning is checking to see how much progress we have made along the way.
