Spanish Students Took National Spanish Exam

The Shickley High School Spanish 1 and Spanish 2 students recently took the 2017 National Spanish Exam, sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese. This test is taken by Class A through Class D schools combined, and there were several Shickley students who received recognition for excellent performance in the State of Nebraska Division.

In the Spanish 1, Outside Experience Category, Nicole Swartzendruber received 3rd place, Megan Grote received 4th place, and Karlea Reed received Honorable Mention. In Spanish 2, Courtney Kamler received an Honorable Mention Award. Their Spanish teacher is Shirley Rytych.

"Attaining a medal or honorable mention for any student on the National Spanish Examinations is very prestigious," said Kevin Cessna-Buscemi, National Director of the Exams, "because the exams are the largest of their kind in the United States with over 157,000 students participating in 2017."

Brooke Jorgenson Wins 3rd Place in Congressional Art Caucus Competition

Brooke Jorgenson was selected from all students in Nebraska's 3rd district to receive 3rd place in the Congressional Art Caucus Competition. She created an acrylic "triangulated" form of a pineapple, entitled

"Geometric Sweetness." Her art piece will hang in Congressman Adrian Smith's Grand Island office for one year. Congressman Smith came to Shickley Public School on Thursday, May 4th, to pick up the artwork and personally hand Brooke her certificate. He answered questions at the K-12 assembly and posed for pictures on his way west to see other Nebraska constituents across the state.

This year the CAC competition almost didn't happen. Last year a student from Ferguson, Missouri created a controversial artwork about the riots there, but it was selected as the winner by the Missouri congressman in that district and it hung in the capital hallway. Other congressmen were offended by the content of the piece (against police officers) and demanded it be taken down, but the Missouri congressman claimed free speech and put it back up. From this controversy, the rules for the contest this year were changed, causing the submission date and winner announcement to be pushed back. From this situation, Shickley high school art students were able to talk about how art can impact society, and sometimes causes change, and how it impacted them personally. In



the end, we are glad that the contest went forward and are pleased that Brooke was honored for her artistic talents. Congratulations, Brooke!


College Visits

Shickley Celebrates Academic Success

On Tuesday, May 16th, Shickley Public School held its annual Celebration of Academic Success. At this celebration, students were recognized for outstanding growth and ability. In all, 98 students were recognized for their outstanding growth over the course of the year, which is defined as exceeding the normal growth in reading, math, science, and language usage expected throughout the school year on a national average, regardless of their baseline scores from the fall. In addition, 24 students were recognized for their outstanding ability in reading, math, science, and language usage, as defined by their status in the 95th or higher percentile in standardized assessments.

Six Inducted to Shickley National Honor Society

On Tuesday, May 9th, six students – Jackson Grote, Caleb Hendrickson, Isaac Kamler, Josiah Kamler, Jadyn Kleinschmidt, and Caitlin Mosier – were inducted to the Shickley Public School's Chapter of the National Honor Society. The National Honor Society is the nation's oldest, largest, and most prestigious student recognition program. New members were selected based on their GPA and scholarship, leadership, service, and character. Throughout the school year, chapter members are called upon as leaders within the school and community to lead their peers and model appropriate behaviors. Their most visible activity this year was hosting the school Red Cross blood drive.

2017 Track Season, by Mr. Shipley



It was a year of great performances by our student athletes. They continued to improve throughout the year. Many of them set personal best records and some new school records. The seniors did a great job of being team leaders. Courtney Kamler, Mashaya Dierking, Hunter Krehnke, Chris Lichti, Brett Holtzen, and Noel Gines all helped our team in different ways reach goals and become better as a team. Our season had us place in both boys and girls team events in a variety of meets. A highlight was our boys winning the Turkey Creek Relays. Our regular season finished with the district track meet at Sandy Creek. At the district meet we had athletes qualify for the state meet. State qualifiers on the ladies side were Mashaya Dierking in the triple jump and Courtney Kamler in the pole vault. Letter from Mr. Ippensen, Principal

Author John C. Maxwell said, "Growth is the great separator between those who succeed and those who do not. When I see a person beginning to separate themselves from the pack, it's almost always due to personal growth."

If we accept Maxwell at his word, then at least one element of success is entirely intrinsically – internally – driven, and that is the desire to grow. Too often, we assume that people, whether they are students, adults, ourselves, or others, are of the mindset to want to grow. That desire though, the desire to grow, must be fostered; it must be nurtured and tended to, like a tomato plant or a rose bush. It must be fed, pruned, and sometimes weeded. But, at the end, what you will have is a grown and productive tomato plant, or a beautiful rosebush. Just like the tomato plant and rosebush, our students must be tended to all year long, not just while they are at school, at practice, at work, or at home. They must be challenged – we all must be challenged – to grow, but the only way to do this is to try something new, something scary, something different. We don't often try new, scary, or different things without encouragement and support. This is where we as teachers, and you as parents, family members, and community members can help our students; encourage them to try new things, support them in their efforts, and ask them about what they are doing and what they are learning. This is all part of the process of preparing students for success.
