The activity ended with students following the directions, exactly as written, trying to get to the known location. The keynote presentation was about Social Justice Journalism. Professor Joe Starita, and UNL students shared their Wounds of Whiteclay project experience. Their presentation emphasized that through journalism student voices can make a positive impact on society.

Students also attended a number of breakout sessions on special topics, including:

- UNL photography professor Bruce Thorson shared secrets of taking outstanding sports photos and creating other kinds of award-wining photos.
- Journalism instructor Jessica Fargen Walsh showed attendees how to craft impactful headlines.
- Omaha World-Herald columnist Matthew Hansen discussed his methods of thinking creatively about story ideas.
- Veteran reporters Cindy Lange-Kubick and Peter Salter of the Lincoln Journal Star provided tips for writing feature stories.
- Former *Chicago Tribune* journalist Katie Nieland presented important design principles to help publications stand out.
- Dirk Chatelain, *Omaha World-Herald* sports writer, talked about how to tell memorable and engaging sports stories that resonate beyond the playing field.
- Lani Hanson, former editor of UNL's campus newspaper, the *Daily Nebraskan*, shared leadership ideas related to keeping your staff happy, motivated, and productive.

At the convention, awards were handed out for last year's publications. Shickley's 2016-17 yearbook "We Are Shickley" received a Superior rating and special Golden Kernel awards for theme and coverage!

Last year Tyler Lear was a full-time yearbook staff member who took a journalism class. He was responsible for most of the photo sorting, selecting, and editing for the publication. Apply2College

Applying to a college can be one of the most exciting, and sometimes scariest, moments in a young person's life. Many graduating students get stuck when filling out college applications because of unknown technical wording, uncertainty of the steps to take to complete the application, or knowing what to do once the

application is complete. As a way to help alleviate the stress Shickley seniors may feel when completing the potentially daunting task of applying to colleges, a couple of class periods were set aside on October 12th to help them fill out at least one application. Apply2College, a campaign sponsored by Education Quest, is used as a way to encourage seniors graduating from Nebraska high schools to apply to college. The seniors were given help from a Central Community College representative, Mrs. Jorgenson, and Mrs. Noel. At the end of the two class periods, there were a total of 19 applications completed, which does not include the additional 17 applications that were submitted before the day of the event. Reading Excitement

A great article provided by the *Parents Make a Difference Newsletter* discusses the importance of making reading exciting. Strong reading skills are beneficial in every school subject, but experts say that to build reading abilities, children must *want* to read. Unfortunately, many children just aren't interested.

To show your child that reading is enjoyable and rewarding:

- * **Listen to audiobooks**. This is a way to show a reluctant reader how interesting books can be. Young children may enjoy recordings made by parents. They can follow along with the book while listening.
 - Axis 360 our e-Book program provides great audio books at all age-levels.
- * **Sign your child up for a pen pal**. Kids love receiving mail and learning about life in other countries. Ask your child's teacher or a librarian about how to get involved.
- * **Take a field trip.** Challenge your child to research attractions in your area, such as museums and parks. Then ask her to be your tour guide as she shares with you what she's learned.
- * **Follow current events.** Is there a developing news story that interests your child? Read the latest reports in the paper or online together each night.
- * **Give reading coupons**. Show your child that you think reading is special by giving them reading coupons. Some might be for 30 minutes of reading with you. Others might be good for a trip to the bookstore or an extra trip to the library to select a book. Reading coupons also make great rewards for good behavior.

FFA Competes at Land Judging Contest

The Little Blue Natural Resources District hosted the South Central Land Judging Contest at the Bruning Dam. During this contest students determined depth of soil, texture, permeability, slope of a specific area, and the amount of erosion that has taken place. Once that information was determined they found the land capability

Another thing that we focus on early is that it is ok to seek out help. I think a lot of times in our lives we put pressure on ourselves to have all the answers or solutions to all of our problems when in reality we don't. For a lot of people, (myself included) we can take it as a shot to our pride if we need to seek out help. One thing I've come to learn and try to relay to our students (and myself for that matter) is that we don't have all the answers. Seeking out help when it is needed is something that takes a lot of guts because it goes against our natural inclinations. When we seek out the needed help, we allow ourselves to expand outside of our comfort zone and to learn something and get a new perspective on a subject that we may not have had before. Please encourage your students to reach out when they aren't sure, because they shouldn't have all the answers, no one does, myself included. When we do reach out, we can learn things we didn't know before and that allows all of us to grow, not only ourselves but our classmates, our school, and our community, and that is a good thing.

In closing, thank you for all you do for the kids I get to work with in the classroom and the school. I've been told many times that I must be crazy for wanting to work with kids every day. But when I think about it, I think you'd have to be crazy not to want to work with our kids. How many places can you go and have an opportunity to make someone's day? Teach them something they never knew? See the smile or the laugh that is worth a thousand words? These are the types of things I get to experience on a daily basis and these things can make even the worst of days seem pretty good! So again, thank you for all you do for the kids I get to work with each day. They make my job worth it!

Plant Science Class Teaches Soil Lesson to the Fourth Grade

Letter from Mr. Ippensen, Principal

In the world of education, there are many processes at work. Early in their educational careers, we are teaching students the fundamentals of subjects and ideas. Students learn math facts and spelling, rules and exceptions. These fundamentals are necessary in the next steps of understanding the complexities of the concepts as they grow, and for students to grow and progress. Nothing is as simple as the fundamentals make it seem, but without the fundamentals, students don't have the building blocks for analysis and synthesis which they will need in order to be successful in high school, college, and career.

Analysis and synthesis, or destruction and creation, are at the heart of deep and critical thinking. The ability to act in creative and innovative manners, to think critically, and to solve problems depends on the ability to break a problem or situation down to its most basic issues, and then to build a solution. This doesn't happen without practice, though. This practice can't be haphazard, or random; it must be purposeful and directed.

John Boyd, in his seminal work entitled *Destruction and Creation*, provides us with two models for teaching these skills: "We can start from a comprehensive whole and break it down to its particulars or we can start with the particulars and build towards a comprehensive whole." As you walk through the halls at Shickley Public School, you will see this work being done, and you will see the fundamentals being taught and developed; you will see the process of developing the ability to analyze and synthesize in each of our students, slowly but surely preparing them for success.
