## Notes from Mr. Jorgenson

Who is ready for spring? Green leaves, flowers, and grass are signs of spring every year. At school, spring also brings the testing season. We will be assessing students using different tests. The 3rd-12th grades will be taking the MAP test. MAP stands for Measure of Academic Progress. This assessment gives us valuable information. One reason we like this test is that while you can compare it to how others do on it across the nation, it is based more on individual growth. It will also tell us areas of strength/weakness for individuals, classrooms, and our district. Juniors will be taking an additional test. This will be the second year in a row that every junior will be taking the ACT test. Those students will be testing on April 3rd. The final assessment that our students will be taking is the state test, which has a new title, the NSCAS. It stands for the Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System. This name replaces the NeSA which stood for the Nebraska State Assessment. Student in grades 3-10 will be taking these tests.

As you can see, our students will be busy this spring in the classroom. We always encourage parents that if you have a student in these grades that you encourage them to do well, but also to make sure that they are getting plenty of rest and nourishment while they are at home during this testing window. I know that our teachers will have them prepared for the exams, and we will see results that will be outstanding!

Finally, we are wrapping up the end of the year and the summer projects are being set. We have already completed one project. The old building has always had a little bit of water coming in the boiler rooms. The surfacing outside was asphalt and has never been very good about getting the water away from the buildings in between the junior high wing and the high school building. We took out the asphalt and replaced it with concrete. We are hoping that will alleviate the problem. Spring showers should let us know if it worked!

## BDS Girls' Basketball by Coach Nutter

This basketball season was the most successful season since being part of the BDS co-op. The Lady Eagles finished the season as the 2018 class D1 State Runners-Up with a record of 26-3. This is the most wins in program history. This group of Lady Eagles were also part of the first state wins in program history, beating Friend 56-47 on Thursday and Ansley-Litchfield 62-50 on Friday of the state tournament in Lincoln. The Lady Eagles first loss of the season came at the Nebraska Wesleyan Holiday Tournament championship to eventual class D2 Runner-Up Humphrey St. Francis. Then in January at the MUDECAS Tournament, the Lady Eagles fell to eventual D2 Champion Fall City Sacred Heart. After finishing third at MUDECAS the Lady Eagles went on a tear through the Crossroads conference. The Lady Eagles won the CRC conference tournament in dominating fashion against Dorchester, Meridian, and Exeter-Milligan. To finish out the regular season, the Lady Eagles went undefeated in conference play and took home top spot as CRC Regular Season Champions. The 2017-2018 Lady Eagles also captured the first district title in program history beating Johnson-Brock and earning their way into the state tournament. The final loss of the season came on "Championship Saturday" where the Lady Eagles loss to a tough North Central squad to capture the D1 Runner-Up honor.

This was a very special group of kids to get to coach and be around. All throughout the season we talked about doing the little things well and being tougher than the teams we played. As the year progressed, we learned to trust each other more, that communication breeds success, and to have as much fun as possible along the way. A huge thank you goes out to the communities for all your support throughout the season. To the seniors, I want to say thank you for your leadership and taking BDS Girls' Basketball to places it's never been before through your hard work and love for each other. What a ride! What a team! What an experience!

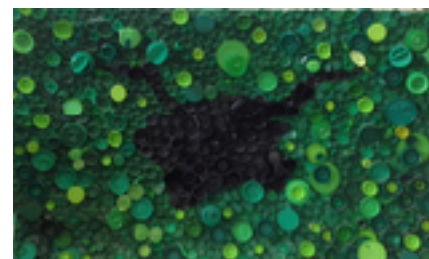

## Shickley Public School Hosts Red Cross Blood Drive

On Friday, March 16<sup>th</sup>, Shickley Public School held their fifth annual blood drive. The Red Cross's blood drive theme this year is "Hope begins with you."

At the blood drive, the National Honor Society gave hope by providing the personnel needed to load and unload the equipment and staff the registration table. Forty-seven people, including 7 students and 12 staff members, chose to stand out on Friday by donating 48 total units of blood. This helped Shickley to meet the Red Cross goal for the drive of 48, and the minimum goal of 35 units, which qualifies the school to be eligible for a \$250 scholarship from the Red Cross for one senior.

The Shickley Public School blood drive is one of three held each year in Shickley, with the others being held in the fall and in the summer. Shickley Public School is proud to be part of this rotation, and proud to have chosen to give hope to those who need it.

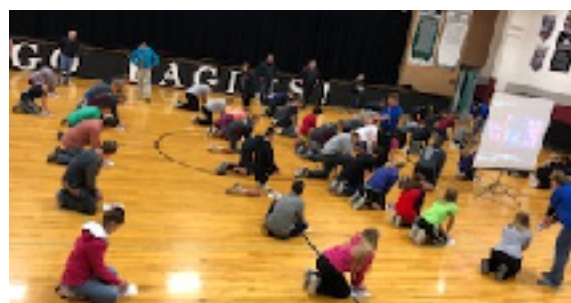

## Today's School, by School Board Member Joe Kamler

Last November, I attended the Nebraska State Education Conference. The conference is held in Omaha and provides an opportunity for school board members and superintendents to keep up with K-12 education trends and programs.

During the three day event, there were fifty-six different topics discussed, approximately seven for each session. Unfortunately, attendees could only select one topic for each session. The following topics were among those being offered: *'Reengaging Youth'* (This session discussed the results of a Nebraska school that received a grant to assist students who had dropped out to gain credits in order to graduate high school.), *'Cameras in the Classroom,'* *'School Safety-Lockdown Procedures,'* *'Use of Force & Restraint to Control Students in the Classroom,'* and *'Marijuana & the Public Schools.'* I was surprised that these topics were among those being offered. I didn't attend any of these sessions; however, these issues must be prevalent in Nebraska schools for them to be addressed at this conference.

We are fortunate that our youth are being educated in a school district where the parents, school staff, teachers, administration, and school board members are primarily focused on student academic achievement. At times, this can mean moving classrooms around, adding new technology components, offering strategic teacher professional development programs, renovating the school structure, building a green house, revamping teacher evaluations, and updating school policies. All of these things are either currently happening or have taken place in recent years in the Shickley school district.

A couple of the sessions I attended were *'Building Engaged Schools: A Great Place To Work & Learn'* and *'New Directions for Work Based Learning.'* I gained from attending these sessions and feel that I can apply some of the things presented to our school. It was refreshing for me to leave Omaha filled with some new ideas to apply while contemplating how thankful we all should be for Shickley Public Schools.

## Third Grade Science

Third grade Science has been exciting! Recently, third grade students have been learning about Earth and its surface. Mr. Elwonger showed us his awesome rock collection! Students identified types of rocks including: sedimentary, igneous, and metamorphic rock. They also learned about several landforms on Earth's surface and how they were created from weathering and erosion. They ended the chapter by creating volcanos and watching them erupt!

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## Language Resource News

Just like we exercise the muscles of our body to improve strength and motor control, it is also important to build the strength and control of our mouths. In speech-language, students work on strengthening their tongues and oral motor control in a variety of ways in an effort to improve speech clarity. One of the favorite activities students are enjoying right now is using a gummy lifesaver and pushing their tongues through the hole to break it. The first student to break theirs wins! Another favorite activity is no-hands soccer. Using a straw, cotton ball, and air, students try to blow the cotton ball on the table to their opponent's side of the table. This winter students used that same concept for an indoor snowball fight. To go along with the no-hands theme, students used a straw to pick up small items such as cheerios or bits of paper to sort items or race to see who could fill the cup first. Blowing up balloons is another great activity that builds mouth muscles. These exercises provide a nice break from repeated articulation drills, while still giving their mouths the workouts that they need to improve speech clarity. Feel free to challenge your children at home with these activities.

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## Wellness News

Teachers and staff are in the midst of our 6 week wellness challenge, Indy 500 Fitness Challenge 2018. Individuals and teams are competing in this virtual fitness challenge to win the Indy 500. This virtual race started March 26th and goes through May 6th. There are 6 guidelines that contestants have to complete: exercising at least 30 minutes, eating at least 2 servings of fruit and 3 servings of vegetables, sleeping 7-9 hours a night, and drinking at least 5 cups (40 Ounces) of water each day. Each completed guideline will move their car 2 laps. The number of virtual laps each team moves around the circuit will be measured by each person's completion of those guidelines.

In other wellness news, March 28th we started "Water Wednesday." Each Wednesday there are coolers of fruit/veggie infused waters in the lobby for everyone to fill-up their cups and stay hydrated. 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## Letter from Mr. Ippensen, Principal

The words collaboration and cooperation seem to be interchangeable. However, when you study the roots of each word, they have different meanings. Collaborate – to co-labor – means to work together to achieve a goal, with the focus on the goal itself, rather than the work each person does. Cooperation – to co-operate – means to work together to achieve a goal, with the focus of each individual on the work he or she does on the way to achieving the goal. Our students must be able to work in both types of environments, and at Shickley Public School, we are intentionally working to create both collaborative and cooperative environments and experiences, as we prepare our students for success.

We can find examples of both collaborative and cooperative experiences throughout our students' careers, with the clearest examples coming from our co-curricular sports and activities. There are "team" sports and activities and "individual" sports and activities. The reason they are described as such is because of where the focus is placed. The "team" sports and activities – like volleyball, football, basketball, one-act, band, and choir – are more collaborative in nature. As the common saying goes, "You play for the name on the front of your jersey, not the back." The "individual" sports and activities – like track and speech – tend to focus on the work of each individual, but when team points are given, it shows the activity's cooperative nature. The contributions to success are provided by the work and performance of each individual participant, not necessarily the interaction by teammates. Neither type of sport or activity, "team" nor "individual," is inherently better than the other. Each provides lessons our students must learn to be successful.
