Critical Thinking and Problem-Solving in Study Skills 7, by Mrs. Noel

What is the difference between a critical thinker and a problem solver? Many times the two words are used interchangeably. The 7th Grade Study Skills class determined that critical thinking is discovering different options and outcomes of decision making while problem-solving is figuring out how to go from point A to point B once the critical thinking has concluded. The students have been practicing their critical thinking and problem-solving by completing Ted.ed riddles online and will complete a project that will require them to find an issue or problem within their world, critically think through the problem to find different solutions and methods to achieve success, and finally problem-solve how to implement their solutions.

Relationships in College and Career Readiness, by Mrs. Noel

Humans are known as social creatures. They want to have relationships with others, whether it's familial, friendship, work-based, or romantic. The College and Career Readiness class has been discussing the different types of relationships they are currently in and what they receive from each of the relationships, such as love, respect, and acceptance. During the month of December the staff will be participating in the EHA Wellness challenge, *Flavor Infusion*. During this challenge participants will learn about healthy alternatives to adding flavor to their meals in an effort to reduce their intake of salt. Sodium overload can lead to high blood pressure or heart and kidney disease. It can also enhance inflammatory conditions such as arthritis and hormonal conditions. Reducing sodium doesn't mean you have to give up flavor. Adding herbs and spices, improves the taste of foods and helps preserve them longer.
