No matter where you look...Christmas is definitely "in the air"! Amid the scurrying to find appropriate gifts and attending family events, many seasonal school activities increase the excitement. On Thursday, December 6th, the Shickley preschool through sixth grade students gave an excellent performance in their elementary vocal music Christmas program, which was enjoyed by many family members and friends. After the program, several sixth graders, who had many speaking parts and actions throughout the program, were heard to exclaim enthusiastically, "That was FUN!" They especially liked it because of all the action and excitement throughout the program!

The Christmas spirit was extended into the Spanish classes in 5th, 6th, and 7th grades and in Spanish 1 and 2 in high school, as the students used the internet to learn about a wide variety of Christmas customs throughout the twenty different countries that speak Spanish. In many countries the Christmas season actually begins with intensity after the first week of December and extends through the "Día de los Reyes" (The Day of the Kings...or Epiphany), on January 6th. High school students prepared slide presentations about some customs in each of their country of choice, with links to videos for information and to colorful pictures for the younger students. All Spanish classes have also enjoyed making some creative "Ojos de Diós" with yarn, cutting "papeles picados" ("cut paper" art projects) for Christmas decorations, creating pop-up Christmas cards (in Spanish, of course), and singing some Spanish Christmas carols.

Not only will the high school Spanish 1 and 2 classes celebrate the Día de los Reyes in their own classes with gifts and games, but the seniors are planning some exciting activities to commemorate that day for the 5th and 6th graders. However, those celebrations will be a few days later than January 6th, since the Día de los Reyes falls on Sunday, and we will have to wait until we return to school after Christmas vacation. 
"¡Feliz Navidad!"

Life Skills Being Taught in College & Career Readiness Class, by Mrs. Noel

Knowing how to do basic skills such as cooking and sewing are a necessity when living on your own. The seniors spent a great portion of December learning self-defense, sewing, and cooking skills in their College & Career Readiness class. When the students began these three units some did not have any experience doing the skills. The units provided basic skills that they can add to and improve on as they get older.

After completing the relationships unit, the seniors were given the opportunity to learn and practice some maneuvers they can use if they are put into situations where they need to escape close contact encounters. The self-defense showed the seniors what to do if they are grabbed from behind, how to escape if their wrists are grabbed, and how to get away from someone who is sitting on top of them.

In the sewing unit, the students learned how to sew three different types of buttons onto a cloth swatch, sew a button onto a shirt, fix a hem that has come undone, and sew a seam back together.

The cooking unit allowed the students to cook and bake some common foods that they now make at college. These foods included: macaroni and cheese (both homemade and boxed), spaghetti, eggs (fried, scrambled, and sunny-side up), egg salad sandwiches, deviled eggs, soup, brownies, and cookies.

Overall the kids really enjoyed the hands-on learning and will be able to utilize the skills they learned as they continue their lives into college and beyond. A special thank you goes out to our guest instructors Jan Noel, who taught the sewing unit and Mrs. Coffey, who taught the self-defense unit.

On December 21st, we held our Academic Awards Celebration and recognized students for their accomplishments from Kindergarten through twelfth grade. Students in grades K, 1, and 2 were given special certificates as nominated by their

teachers. Students in grades 3 through 12 received recognition for their scores on the MAP tests, NSCAS statewide tests, and ACT tests. We had 43 students (grades 3-12) who scored in the 81st percentile or above on at least one of the MAP subtests in either Reading, Language Arts, Math or Science. There were 49 students recognized for the MAP Growth Award, which means that they exceeded the projected achievement growth for one year's time measuring from winter of last year to the winter of this year. 15 students earned the College and Career Ready Benchmark on at least one subtest on the NSCAS statewide assessment and/or the Exceeds Standards on the NeSA Science statewide assessment taken last spring. I would also like to share that we have 5 students in the high school who have already earned a score of 25 or better on the ACT test. All together, we have some exceptional students and teachers who are worthy of our recognition. In fact, I would like to share this recent post, that is to the right, from the Lincoln Journal Star. As you can see, Shickley made the top 28!



Lastly, I want to give a special thanks to Darlene, Colleen, and Pam in the kitchen for their help in allowing our students to bake and decorate holiday treats to share with those in our community. This would not have been possible without their flexibility and willingness to help. In addition, the rest of our staff certainly put in a little extra to make this work and I am grateful. A big thank you to all or our clubs and sponsors, as plates of goodies, toys, clothes, and monetary donations were given to spread the holiday cheer.
