The Grind with Mrs. Coffey

We are Nebraska Strong!

In the midst of what has been one of the most devastating disasters across our great state, our people continue to step up and help out those around them. There is no place like Nebraska, and it truly isn't for everyone.

It is for individuals like head Nebraska Volleyball Coach, John Cook. I had the sincere privilege to be at the Nebraska Rural Community Schools Association (NRCSA) annual conference last week when Coach John Cook addressed many Nebraska superintendents and school board members. Coach Cook had many inspiring and motivating themes to share with those attending the conference and I would like to share some of those that really resonated with me:

- -It can be your biggest disaster or your finest hour; it's all in how you react.
- -The longer I coach the less I know. For John Cook it is coaching, for me, it's my work in education, for you maybe it is being a parent, small business owner, or your job. Regardless of what we do, if we are willing to open ourselves up to knowing more and evolving with the work that we do, there will always be something to be learned. As long as we never settle and refuse to "arrive" we will always grow and progress in what we love to do.
- -We all need a team and not just any team. Currently, we probably all serve on at least one "team" within our workplace or our family environment. The team Coach Cook speaks about is one separate from the "big team" you are working with. This is an outside team that makes you better for your "big team;" the workplace, your family, the committees or boards you serve on, etc. The team pushes you to become better in all aspects of your life.
- -If you can't make great decisions all the time, how will you make a great decision when the game is down to the wire. Think about all the decisions we have to make each and every day. Now think about all the decisions students have to make. Are your children willing to make great decisions all week long; before, during, and after school as well as the weekends? If they are, when they get faced with a really tough decision they will be more likely to make that their finest hour and not their biggest disaster. It's all about the core values we live by each and every day, and not letting a situation, environment, or person change those values for any reason.
- -You have to have goals. Not only do you have to have them, but you also need to know where you're going, write them down, see them, share them, and commit to them. His analogy of commitment was to think about your morning breakfast. If you had bacon and eggs, you know the chicken made a little bit of a commitment to your breakfast, but the pig was all in!
- -The disease of "me" is always out there. Don't let one person suck the life out of your "team." Focus on the team and have an attitude of "With Each Other, For Each Other."
- -Ask yourself daily: Who needs me today? Don't wait, think about it ahead of time, and make a difference.
- -There are three bones we need to develop in our young people: the backbone (we need our kids more than ever to stand up to challenges and make strong decisions); the wishbone (kids need to dream big and be creative); and the funny bone (so they can have fun, be inspired, and want to be a part of something greater than themselves).

Coach John Cook had a lot of great advice, some spectacular stories, and it was a pleasure to hear him speak. I believe in these past weeks Nebraska has shown how strong we are and has not let this time be our biggest disaster, but as you have hopefully seen from media outlets and social media this has certainly been one of our finest hours and it all started with our reactions.

Mr. Johnson Wins Donald A. Lentz Outstanding Bandmaster Award

The Donald. A Lentz Outstanding Bandmaster Award is intended to recognize an individual who has made an outstanding contribution throughout their career. The recipient of the Lentz Award is viewed as one of the superior band directors/educators in Nebraska. Nomination for this award comes from school administrators, fellow directors, and community members.

At the Nebraska State Bandmasters Convention in Lincoln on March 1, Stanley W. Johnson of Shickley was presented this award. Mr. Johnson has had a stellar teaching career that has spanned over 45 years of teaching. In retirement, he has continued to be a mentor for young band directors throughout the state of Nebraska. He has helped and encouraged new teachers as they grow and develop their careers. He continues to be asked to adjudicate at many music contests throughout the state each year. He is also on the staff of The Nebraska Ambassadors of Music, which tours and performs concerts in eight European countries with 300 high school music students every two years.



He has been very active in his career, being a member of NSBA, NMEA, NAFME, and Phi Beta Mu - International Band Fraternity, where he has served as president. During his career, he has written articles for the Instrumentalist Magazine and Teaching Music Magazine, and has presented sessions at both the State and National Conventions, dealing with teaching music in rural America.

Student Council Happenings



Throughout April, students in 3rd-10th grade will be taking the Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System (NSCAS) tests for English Language Arts (ELA), Math, and Science. Every student in these grades is required to take the test so it is strongly encouraged that the students are in school on testing days. This will alleviate make-up days and loss of classroom instruction time.

The 2019 Longhorn Speech Team has had a very successful season! Each team member improved consistently throughout the season. The students competed with several other students, not only in Class D but also class A, B, and C schools. The team attended meets at Thayer Central, Sutton, Doniphan Trumbull, Aurora, and Meridian. The team earned 4th out of the 14 schools in the Crossroads Conference that was held at Meridian High School. The Longhorn Speech Team placed 3rd at Districts. All 11 team members made it to district finals and earned a district medal. That is a huge accomplishment.

State Qualifiers included: Caleb Hendrickson in Extemporaneous speaking; Alyssa Nolt in Poetry and Persuasive Speaking; Kaylee Noel in Serious Prose; and Raleigh Shipley in Entertainment Speaking. State Speech was hosted by the University of Nebraska-Kearney on Friday, March 22nd. Caleb earned a gold medal placing 1st in Extemporaneous Speaking! Alyssa also made finals and earned a 5th place medal for her poetry program, Peace. Raleigh placed 8th in Entertainment Speaking which he wrote about girls and how they are confusing beings. Kaylee placed 8th in Serious Prose, performing the piece Bella Rose, by P.J. Holeman. Alyssa placed 15th in Persuasive Speaking, which she wrote about the effects of childhood violence. - April 10th, 11th, and 12th NSCAS English Language Arts (Grades 3-8)
- April 16th and 17th NSCAS Math (Grades 3-8)
- April 25th and 26th NSCAS Science (Grades 5 & 8)
