Reading fluency is such an important piece in reading success and comprehension. Reading fluency is the ability for your child to read smoothly, accurately, and with expression. Through the *Parents Make the Difference Newsletter*, we have a great way to evaluate how parents and guardians are helping develop your child's reading fluency.

- 1. Do you set aside time for your child to read to you in addition to the time you spend reading to him/her?

- 4. Do you offer help if your child asks how to pronounce a word, and then encourage him to keep reading?
- 5. Do you discuss a book after your child is finished reading?

While the holidays provide a chaos that people somehow find a way to enjoy, it also is an indicator that a lot of classroom chaos is about to begin! No, I'm not necessarily talking about kids going crazy on holiday cheer (even though that does tend to happen), but instead it is about the chaos of the month of December for getting things done before the holiday break.

In the classroom, I've been very pleased with the overall work ethic of the students I get to work with daily. Thank you for encouraging this because while we can encourage and work on that at school, educational importance starts at home with parents and families taking an active part in not only their kids' education, but being an active role model in their lives. Thank you for caring about your kids, we do notice!

One thing that I commonly see with the age group that I work with (Grades 5, 6, and 7) is that pride, peer pressure, or in some cases, slight paranoia can overtake a student when it comes to getting their work done the way it is meant to be done. The kids at Shickley take a lot of pride in doing work on their own and showing what they are capable of in front of their teachers and friends. The "problem" with that is (if you look at it as a problem) that even the brightest of our bright will run into a problem where they just may not know, or may not be sure and need some guidance on how to solve the problem. Here is where the pride, peer pressure, and paranoia kick in. "If I ask a question, my friends will notice I need help," and "I'm pretty sure I know, but I do not know for sure, I'll just try it and see what happens." If help is needed, we don't always seek out the help (that is ready for the taking) because of pride, peer pressure, and maybe even a little paranoia. I bring this up, because no matter how much I encourage asking questions and even double checking to make sure we are on the right path, our students will sometimes avoid getting the help they may need. Please encourage your child to ask questions and to make sure they aren't losing out on learning opportunities. Many times the difference between knowing and not knowing, the A or the B, the success or the failure, is the 30 seconds it takes to get up and be proactive to make sure we are doing the job right. Again please encourage your kid to use the resources available all the time! It leads to success!

Finally, a few heads up as how the chaos of December affects the classroom. We will be taking MAPS tests the first two weeks of December. I do my best to schedule these on Tuesday, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. I have a tentative plan set at this time, but the dates are not definite other than I will make sure it's in the mid-week days of those first two weeks. We will have an end of quarter party the last Friday before the break. Also, as the kids' are well aware, basketball season has started which means my mind starts running in a different gear (Go back to chaotic time of the year). If you think of anything that I may be missing or have any questions about things going on, please reach out to me and ask.

The College and Career Readiness students have spent the second quarter learning more about basic life skills such as healthy and unhealthy relationships, self-defense, how to tie a tie, and cooking. On November 14, the students learned some basic self-defense moves from Superintendent Mrs. Coffey. She showed them how to use the strongest parts of

their bodies, their elbows and knees. She also discussed with them some common knowledge ways to keep themselves safe such as locking their doors after they enter their car or while they are loading items into the trunk, walking in a group at night, knowing and being aware of their surroundings. The kids were then allowed to practice some of the skills taught to them on each other. Later in the month, the students learned how to tie a traditional tie. Finally, the students spent the end of November and will spend most of December learning how to cook food they can prepare when living on their own and sewing skills such as sewing on buttons, hemming pants, and fixing seams.



Principal Notes

The holiday season is upon us. Please take time to relax and enjoy time with family and friends. We have so much to be grateful for!

Every five years, Nebraska schools are required to have an External Visit conducted by educators outside of Shickley Public Schools. These visitors observe our school and assess our effectiveness in meeting our goals highlighting what we do well and perhaps suggesting things we can do to improve. While this is mandated under Rule 10, it should serve as far more than a process we go through for mere compliance. Our school improvement process should create a clear map and vision for the direction our school is moving towards and be something that we all embrace and strive for. I would like to share with you the goals that have been identified by members of our school improvement committee. These goals will drive a lot of what we do for the next two and a half years as we prepare for our 2022 visit.

Our team has identified the following three goals.

- 1. All students will improve their reading comprehension.
- 2. Shickley Public Schools will continuously improve the culture of the district.
- 3. Shickley Public Schools will improve the social and emotional awareness of every student.

A recent Education Week article titled *Screen Time is Up as Reading Scores Drop. Is there a link?* discussed that across the nation, student reading scores are in decline. The article stated, "A little more than 1 in 3 American students read proficiently in grades 4 or 8, according to the <u>2019 National Assessment of Educational Progress</u>". While I can tell you that our numbers in Shickley are far better than the national average, we do have room for improvement. I believe reading is one of the most important and foundational aspects of education and I am glad that we are going to target reading improvement as a school goal. In addition to the reading that takes place within our curriculum, we also utilize accelerated reader, Axis 360, and IXL. Students' scores and growth are evaluated by our state and school assessments. We utilize the data to drive our instruction and help all of our students improve their reading comprehension.

Our school and community are exceptional because we care about each other. Our reputation for being exceptional in academics and athletics has been earned because we have a strong culture. In his book *From Good To Great*, Jim Collins said, "the enemy of the great is the good" and therefore, we are going to work to become even better. One of the indicators of our culture consists of perceptual surveys completed by our students, staff, and community members. Our students and staff just completed theirs and we will be providing a link on our daily bulletin in the near future to hear from members of our community. We value and appreciate all of the feedback we receive.

One of the most pressing issues in schools today is centered around social and emotional health. Here are a few statistics I wrote down while viewing a short film produced by I Love Public Schools. I would encourage you to watch the film at: https://iloveps.org/films/the-mind-inside-episode-two

95% of teens have cell phones

45% of teens say social media makes them feel overwhelmed by drama

43% of teens feel pressured to only post content that makes them look good

26% of teens say social media makes them feel worse about their own life.

As a school, we are going to intentionally develop relationships with our students beyond the content that we teach. We are going to utilize curriculum such as Second Step and Common Sense Media to have meaningful conversations about social and emotional health.

As principal, I am thankful to be in Shickley and thankful for our students and staff. I look forward to the future as we strive toward reaching our goals.
