5-12 Spanish and PK-6 Music Notes, by Mrs. Ellis

The Spanish room has been a very busy place with students back to school in person. It's been wonderful to be able to interact with students face to face. I appreciate all of the hard work that parents, students, teachers, administration, and the school board have done to make this happen. Students are adapting well to the new norm and education is continuing!

Fifth and sixth grade Spanish meet once a week for Spanish. They have been studying some basic conversational Spanish as well as learning about the geography of Central and South America.

Eighth grade students have Spanish first quarter everyday and they have been studying basic Spanish along with the calendar, seasons, verbs, and grammar. Second quarter, the seventh graders will meet for Spanish daily.

Spanish I has been learning basic Spanish and is currently working on a class memory book. Students will describe themselves using Spanish adjectives and vocabulary they have been studying. They will choose pictures to use for their class memory book.

Spanish II has been studying a lot of vocabulary dealing with the fine arts, shopping, directions, and much more. Grammatically speaking, students are learning to use the past tense, comparisons and superlatives, and will continue to learn various tenses.

Spanish III is learning the subjunctive mood and vocabulary dealing with running errands, doing chores, and using good manners.

The Spanish students are showing continual improvement and it's very rewarding to see.

This year in music class, the third and fourth graders are learning to play the recorder. Third graders have recorders on Wednesday while fourth graders meet on Thursday. Practicing outside of class time is very essential to the success of the student, so I encourage all students to practice.

Please mark your calendars for the Winter concert on Tuesday, December 8th at 7:00 p.m. This will be a PK-12 concert this year. There will be more information to follow as the date approaches.

With the new COVID regulations, the classroom looks a little different this year. The elementary music classes are not combined as they have been in the past. Students are also not singing as much as they were before COVID. This has given Music teachers an opportunity to become more creative when instructing students. The elementary students have been participating in more Music and Movement activities. Students seem to be enjoying this new change and are still learning the music standards particular to their grade level.

Congratulations to several Spanish students from Shickley High School who attained national recognition for excellent performance on the 2020 National Spanish Examinations.

Students from Shickley High School earned a total of three silver medals and one honorable mention. "Attaining a medal or honorable mention for any student on the National Spanish Examinations is very prestigious," said Kevin Cessna-Buscemi, National Director of the Exams, "because the exams are the largest of their kind in the United States with over 140,000 students registered in 2020."

Students earning silver medals from Shickley High School include Macy Kamler-Spanish I, Madeline Kamler and Alyssa Nolt-Spanish II, and receiving an honorable mention is Reid Richards-Spanish I. Students from Shickley High School have a long history of high achievement on these exams and are taught by Spanish teacher, Valerie Ellis.

Notes from Principal Warren

Over the past few years I have been reading and listening to podcasts to broaden my horizons. One author/podcaster that I have become very interested in is Jocko Willink. Jocko is a retired Navy Seal and an owner of a leadership consulting firm. As you can imagine he talks about leadership and war stories. He also brings in guests to help give him a different perspective on certain topics that the show is focusing on that week. One of my favorite topics that Jocko talks about in his books and podcasts is extreme ownership. He talks about it so much that he titled his first book Extreme Ownership.

Extreme Ownership is a concept that he talks about a lot and expands on what his message is. It is an interesting viewpoint in itself. Basically he says that everything that happens can be affected by you alone. Whether it be good or bad, it is a reflection of you. If a team member does something that doesn't benefit the team then it was a miscommunication from you. Here are the two main concepts that I got from his first book.

- 1. Take ownership for things that others do. If they did something wrong then it is probably because you, as a leader, didn't do a good job of explaining what you want or needed.
- 2. When taking ownership of a problem, state why it didn't work and what you are going to do the next time so it doesn't happen again.

Now this point isn't always what people want to hear or that sometimes things don't happen the way you want it. However, it is an interesting point of view. Whether or not it is your fault for something that doesn't get done, is there something that you could learn or do better the next time? This allows us to look at our own self and how we can improve upon ourselves rather than focusing on the issues of others.

We as people are always growing and learning from our past experiences. I value this perspective because I try to focus on the things that I can control, things that I can learn from. If something doesn't go as planned, what can I do better the next time the next time around? If our children don't get the grade they desire on a test? What can we do to help them succeed for their next test? What could they have done to better prepare themselves?

I will leave you with one last thought. Obviously we want our children to grow up and be responsible, successful and contribute to society. Sometimes in order for them to succeed they need to fail. Failure is hard to accept and no one likes failing, however it is what we do with our failures that help us grow.
