Nebraska Legislative Updates

LB 364: a bill that takes money more away from public schools

- Expensive: millions of dollars in tax credits will go to wealthy corporations and individuals, while our public schools are already 49th in the nation when it comes to state support of K-12 education; these tax credits will make it even worse. Costing \$10 million dollars year one and possibly ballooning to \$100 million annually.
- Inequity: private and parochial schools could receive public dollars and legally discriminate against children based
 on religion, sex, language proficiency, disability, etc. These private schools are not required to provide special
 education, transportation, or English language learner services. Tax-subsidized scholarships do NOT promote
 equal educational opportunities. Data has shown that school privatization has increased segregation in schools
 and harmed student achievement. Taxpayers' hard-earned money should not be funding the education needs of
 institutions that do NOT serve ALL children.
- Continuation of Defunding Public Schools: millions and millions of dollars would be diverted to private and parochial schools, instead of being available to public schools and other state priorities.

Public schools in the state of Nebraska currently serve 9 out of every 10 children in the state. This legislation would divert millions to a brand new system that has never been funded by the state before; while public schools, like Shickley, continue to receive minimal state funding. The legislative revenue committee received 77 letters in opposition to the bill and 11 in support of it. If the bill were to make it out of committee, more voices of opposition will need to be heard.

Here's the Scoop on Addition and Multiplication Facts, by Miss Hansel Title I Teacher

Again this school year, students in Miss Hansel's Title classroom are currently working on mastering and memorizing addition and multiplication facts. Students are eagerly practicing their math facts at home to earn each item of an ice cream sundae (spoon, bowl, sprinkles, etc.). Weekly, students are given a set of math facts to practice and at the end of the week students complete a timed test to show their speediness and mastery. At the end of the unit, students will have earned each piece of their ice cream sundae. Many students have already earned all of their pieces and a few are working hard to earn theirs. We will be masters of facts by the end of the school year!

New to this school year has been the addition of MAP Skills for students. MAP Skills is a skills mastery and progress monitoring assessment that helps teachers drill down to the specific skills each student needs to learn. Each time a student takes the MAPs Test, new skills are created for students to practice. The students in Title and beyond have been working very hard to improve MAP Growth scores and overall math knowledge. Several students from the Fall MAP test to the Winter MAP test increased their score by as many as 15-20 points!

Wow, it is hard to believe that it is already February! The fourth graders have been busy since Christmas break! We spent some time discussing the topic of New Year's Resolutions in writing. We talked about how a resolution is a firm decision to do something different, to better themselves either at home or school. The students were asked to generate a list of a few things they would like to change about themselves and then narrow them down to three things, one each related to school, home and friends. They came up with some great ideas, from eating healthier and exercising to being organized and helping out more at home. So, parents, be on the lookout for more helpful 4th graders at home!
